Course Description:

The Practical Nursing Geriatrics course introduces the student to health promotion and maintenance of geriatric patients. Students will explore attitude toward aging and the developmental tasks associated with geriatric patients. The curriculum emphasizes mental health needs of the aging adult and teaches the practical nursing student how to recognize signs of elder abuse and neglect. Students also learn about principles of safety, self-care, rehabilitative care, restorative care, and long-term care; nutrition, elimination, stages of grief and end-of-life care issues and supportive care for life transitions and spirituality.

Basic Geriatric Nursing, 8th Ed., Williams

Course Goals:

Upon on completion of this course students will be able to care for geriatric patients with a wide variety of healthcare needs and settings. The practical nursing student will be able to successfully plan and coordinate long-term care for the geriatric patient and delegate tasks to unlicensed personnel. Students will demonstrate critical thinking skills and use these to modify nursing skills based on the patient's physiologic and psychosocial needs.
